MASTERS AND SERVANTS ACT.-Yesterday two cases under this act came before the bench. The first was John Eales v. Jerry Looney. It appeared that Looney was a ticket-of-leave holder, per Havering, hired by Mr. Eales for twelve months, and that he had been well behaved for the first three months, but subsequently became idle and insolent, and on the 31st May positively refused to work faster at raking hay when required, and had since refused to work at all. Mr. Bennett, a superintendent of Mr. Eales's, deposed that Looney, on the occasion referred to, was not doing half work. In defence Looney said he was working at the time as hard as he possibly could, and had not been called to work since. The bench convicted Looney of a breach of agreement, and sentenced him to one month's imprisonment with hard labour.-
